#### THE FRIENDS' MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

The Friends thank all who have responded to our 2023 membership drive by renewing membership or by becoming a new member. #### THE STORY OF FRIENDS

The first group to name itself a "Friends group" was founded in France in 1913. The first group in the US was founded by Mrs. Al Chase of Glen Ellyn, Illinois in 1922 and was officially named Friends of the Library. At that time, \$365 was raised to help purchase books for the library. That same year another group called Friends of the Library was started in Syracuse, New York. It is not known if someone there may have known or heard of Mrs. Chase's endeavors, or, perhaps, the name may have been one of coincidence. In 1929, The American Library Association formed a Friends of Libraries Committee to assist with the formation of more groups. Until 1980, the committee remained within ALA when it became a separate but affiliated organization called Friends of the Libraries USA. By 1965, membership swelled to include over 2,000 friends groups with approximately 600,000 members. In 2009, it merged with the Association for Library Trustees and Advocates but then again changed its name to United for Libraries.

In 1991, several Oneonta community members saw the need to provide HML with support both financially and with other services and, familiar with Friends groups across the country, formed The Friends of HML. Over these many years The Friends of HML, through community support, has met its commitment of providing funds and services to HML. The Friends of HML are proud to report that many thousands of dollars have helped fund these endeavors beyond HML's budget. We thank you, members of The Friends, for your confidence in The Friends Board of Directors' decisions and look forward to your continuing support.

#### WHY LIBRARIES ARE ESSENTIAL

Today we are dependent on the internet for information - but always the right answers? Search engines provide information depending on our formulated questions or keywords and so, the data is not always relevant. Instead, one should 'lean on libraries.'

As Eli B. Martin explains: "Because the internet is harder to sort through than a library catalog, there's a strong case that a library's core services are actually becoming much more important."

Five essential reasons why libraries are important and why patrons appreciate them:

- Libraries maintain history and more importantly, truth.

#### THE TRAVELING BOOKMOBILE



Books on wheels are on the road again into area communities according to the Four County Library System (4CLS) providing library services to residents in rural areas and unserved populations for over 40 years. The very first Bookmobile was launched by horse drawn wagon in April 1905 but other means of conveyance have included bicycles, carts, motor vehicles, trains, watercraft, wagons and in some countries camels, donkeys, elephants and mules. The first motorized Bookmobiles were introduced in 1912 and could be purchased for as little as \$1000. After 15 years of use and logging more than 200,000 miles, the 4CLS Bookmobile was replaced by a state of the art 33-foot truck built by Oneonta's Medical Coaches costing about \$230,000. Operating costs are covered by the state Coordinated Outreach Program along

with funding from various counties. The Bookmobile visits many sites in our immediate area including monthly Tuesday stops at St. James Manor, Methodist Churches in Fly Creek and Mt. Vision, monthly Thursday stops at West Oneonta's Town Hall, the Schenevus Valley Lodge in Schenevus, Westford's Fire Station, the First Christian Church in South Valley and Middlefield's Town Hall and carries a collection of about 3,000 books, large print books, audiobooks, and movies with materials for adults, children and teens. According to the 4CLS, any books, CD's or DVDs may be requested prior to the scheduled stop as well as requests for specific titles or authors or general subjects and genres. 4CLS will do its best to fulfill requests. Additionally, books may be returned to any Four County Library System library. Enjoying a library continues even if on wheels.

# From the Director

This year begins with the sense that things will go back to normal after the global pandemic. Last year was one of transition from online programs to those "in real life". There was much less demand for curbside pickup of library material. Although the pandemic rages on, we now have tools to reduce fatalities and prevent or slow the contagion.

A lot happened to be excited about besides the park project in 2022. Some new services the library offers is superfast fiber internet connection that extends into the park. There's also a new collection called the Library of Things. You can borrow things like fishing poles, a sewing machine, a KitchenAid mixer, an Instant Pot, a turntable and lots of STEM Learning Kits.

We also started automatic renewals so you don't have to pay overdue fines. But even better? After the Library Board decided to waive all juvenile overdue fines, overdue fines for adults are now optional. We don't want to turn anyone away from using our resources if they owe a few dollars and research has shown that fining patrons doesn't encourage timely return of materials. Don't forget that you can get notifications for overdue items or items on hold via text message too. Talk to a Library Clerk to add this feature to your account.

The entry into the library was made more welcoming thanks to a generous donation and a grant from Library Construction Aid. It's made a world of difference to the atmosphere and for such a small space, we got a huge amount of positive feedback.

Circulation of our physical collection has skyrocketed and we hope it returns to normal this year. During the pandemic, circulation of electronic formats like ebooks and downloadable audiobooks was at its highest. Last year it continued to increase but at a slower pace. It's great to see people coming back to the library.

We've added to the digitized Local History content that's available on our website. Along with the early years of The Daily Star, we now have Oneonta High School yearbooks, and the oldest City Directories. This collection is fully searchable by any keyword you choose, and articles can be downloaded and shared directly to social media.
