#### The Friends and the QR code

The Friends are adopting the use of the QR code, or Quick Response code- a barcode that stores information in a grid of black and white squares. The code is scanned with a smartphone camera to access the information it contains. Ever popular because of convenience and use, the QR code can be used for many purposes, including accessing information, making payments. ordering food, providing coupons. The list goes on. Invented by Japanese auto manufacturer, Denso Wave, the original purpose of QR codes codes was to track automobile parts during assembly.

# From the Director

Every year, libraries report their activities in the Annual Report to the NYS Division of Library Development. The report has 14 sections and the questions are determined by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) with input from the State Libraries. The goal of the report is to help plan for the future and to document the significance of libraries across the country.

At HML, physical book circulation increased last year by about 2%. The top circulating collection was adult fiction (just like every year) which had a 5% increase. Surprisingly, the DVD and Books on CD collection did not circulate as much as the previous year. I suppose that speaks to the popularity of streaming services and the lack of CD players in cars. Electronic resources continue to be popular, but their circulation dropped slightly.

The number of computer sessions increased by about 9% to a total of 4,710. Use of our free wireless network increased to 6,270 logins.

We saw an increase of about 9% in the number of people who entered the library for a total of 75,000. Thanks to a concerted effort by the Library Clerks, we got a more accurate count of reference questions that were answered. Six times a year, we count our reference questions for a week, then calculate the average for the year. Last year, we answered 10,395 questions! The number of people who have a library card has also increased. With a total of 7,811 cardholders, 47% of them reside in the City of Oneonta.

Our program staff offered 399 programs that were attended by 4,499 people. The Pumpkin Glow continues to grow, and with the Friends of HML sponsorship, we're able to add more activities to the event. The Summer Reading Program enriches the lives of so many youth. We held 48 sessions during the six-week program with 808 attendees. We actually had more adults register for the program than youth. While I'm glad the adults had fun, please register your children and grandchildren for the Summer Reading Program. Our kids need all the help they can get to succeed in life. Our story time programs are as popular as ever. We've been having fun reading, singing, playing, moving, and building. Not to mention learning. We've already had a visit from a parakeet named Sparky' who helped make sure our pinecone bird feeders were just right; built sand castles with our new kinetic sand; had a farewell party for a friend whose family moved out of the area; and made special Valentine Day gifts for our families. It seems each week we're welcoming someone new to our group. One of my favorite aspects of story time is watching the children interact with each other. #### March is Read Across America Month

The month of March is dedicated to celebrating and promoting reading across all ages, due largely to it coinciding with Dr. Seuss' birthday. Dr. Seuss was not a doctor at all, he was a writer and illustrator of very popular children's books and received a Pulitzer Prize in 1984 for his contributions to the education of America's children and their parents.



Reading has a very long history and a time when only a few people knew how to read. "The first written communication did not happen until 3500 B.C. and the first books did not appear until around 23 B.C. in Rome. Around this time, books were also developed in some Asian countries and the Middle East. Before the printing press was introduced in the 15th century, books were quite expensive and rare but as printed books gained popularity, literacy rates began to rise".

Today, even though almost everyone can read, people's inclination toward reading has waned and, unfortunately, the reading culture as a society may be losing ground. But this trend can reverse itself. Let's all celebrate and read every day this month and next and next. Research shows that babies ages 0-5 years old need to hear at least 6,000 words per day to develop strong language skills.and the average person speaks around 16,000 words per day and include talking, reading and singing to those infants and toddlers. (HML staff member's infant daughter is present at the Wednesday Mornings Story time- a great start in developing those language skills). When we love books, good things happen. Reading strengthens our mental muscles, improves comprehension, increases imagination, and boosts memory. **Reading makes us smarter and who doesn't want that?**
