Located on the left side of the driveway, it is opposite the right turn that leads to the main entrance and the other drop box. Approach the drop box with caution and pay attention to your driver side mirror. There is plenty of room and it is an easy reach to the box.

--When you renew your membership or join as a new member, you will receive a Friends of HML plastic window cling. Displaying the cling will show that you support the library.

--A "Courtesy Renewal Notice" is a new service for patrons. You may receive an e-mail explaining that materials you have are due in two days and were automatically renewed for you. Please note the new due date. However, some items may not auto-renew for the following reasons: 1) there is a waiting list for the item, or 2) the item has reached the renewal limit, or 3) the item belongs to a collection that does not allow renewals. --We have said good-bye to Miss Kathryn, the children's librarian. Her new position as a K-12 school librarian is nearer her home. During the Covid shutdown she provided services for children with her online story time and other activities. The children's summer programs were varied and well attended. Children as well as parents praised her work. We wish her well in her new position.

--The library is now digitizing copies of old Oneonta Directories and OHS yearbooks. This will help people in any research they are doing. The Friends are partially funding the project.

-It is with sadness that we report the passing of Barbara Campbell, long time, well-loved librarian at the Milford Free Library. Barb, a talented artist was a lover of all things- books, people, animals, cultures, music, nature and especially her two sons.

IN THE SPOTLIGHT

The Friends are pleased to feature HML staff member AJ who has held the position of library clerk for over a year. In addition to finding AJ behind the entry desk greeting and assisting patrons, AJ notes that an enjoyable part of his job is 'having the opportunity to design displays and bulletin boards for the library, being creative and highlighting different topics for library patrons.' He notes that patrons might be surprised that working on displays and programs would be included in his role as clerk. AJ cites that this summer he conducted his first program, a craft workshop where tile art was made-this leading to additional future programs. AJ's favorite books consist of The City Beautiful by Aden Polydoros, A Lesson in Vengeance by Victoria Lee and A Hundred Thousands Kingdoms by N.K. Jemisin while movies range from The Fifth Element, Attack the Block and Fire Island. AJ spends his 'downtime' watching TV, crocheting or even playing video games enjoying titles from the Nancy Drew series of computer games. When AJ was asked what he would like people to know about the library, he cites that 'while late fees are currently optional, the library is moving toward a future without late fees at all, saying they can act as a barrier to use of the library for all patrons.'

Banned Books Week September 18-24, 2022

Theme: "Books Unite Us. Censorship Divides Us"

Banned Books Week 'brings together the entire community-librarians, booksellers, publishers, journalists, teachers and readers of all types- in shared support of the freedom to seek and to express ideas, even those some consider unorthodox or unpopular and ensuring the availability of those viewpoints to all who wish to read them'. Launched in the 1980's and especially in today's reading culture, banning books across our nation has become a hot topic especially among school boards and political figures. The Banned Books Week Coalition is proud to announce the 2022 Honorary Chair - George M. Johnson, critically acclaimed and frequently banned author who will lead the weeklong event bringing awareness to the harms of censorship. In highlighting the week, The Friends will conduct a drawing for a free banned book. Any library patron who fills out an entry form found in The Friends' newsletter or in the library by October 1 will have the opportunity to win a copy of The Catcher in the Rye by J D Salinger or The Lord of the Flies by William Golding. Drawing will take place on October 3rd.



SUNY ONEONTA'S COMMON READ




SUNY Oneonta's Common Read 'advances diversity by encouraging students to examine and better understand topics such as equity, inclusion and personal history through many lenses'. The campus community is asked to read a diversity related book which is discussed in fall courses. For its 2022 selection, the college has chosen George Takei's New York Times bestselling graphic memoir *They Called Us Enemy* which received *an* American Book Award in 2020. Takei is an actor, author, activist, best known for his role on Star Trek. He will highlight the book's details on his personal experiences growing up in the internment camps, as well as the larger story of Japanese internment in the United States and policies that enabled it. Takei will deliver the Mills Distinguished Lecture on October 24. The public is invited barring any future Covid restrictions.

GOOD NEWS

The Friends of HML are pleased to announce that our organization has been granted 501(c)(3) nonprofit status and are recognized as a charitable organization by the IRS. Why is this important to us? While HML's Board of Trustees and The Friends share a common vision, we are separate, autonomous bodies-each with a distinct role. The Friends are composed of volunteer citizens who have joined together to support, improve, and promote the library but operate with a separate Board of Directors, have our own by-laws but work with the library respecting the role of each organization. Now with our 501(c)(3) status we will be able to apply for and receive grants from private foundations and from the government, can provide



tax deductions to individual donors, receive matching employer donations (if participating) and receive special postage rates. This is an exciting time for The Friends and grateful to HML for the support.

"READING IS TO THE MIND WHAT EXERCISE IS TO THE BODY"

In the 18th century, essayists Joseph Addison and Sir Richard Steele wrote this quote and hundreds of years later, this quote could not be more true. Reading gets one's mind working across different areas- it involves comprehension to process words read, makes one use analytical abilities, stimulates memories and can broaden imagination.

Reading is a neurobiological process that works out brain muscles- even slowing down cognitive decline and may decrease rate of memory loss. Studies such that at the University of California, Berkeley, have reported that reading reduces the level of beta-amyloid, a protein connected to Alzheimer's. However, whether Alzheimer's is prevented or even delayed is not certain. A Yale University study followed 3635 participants for 12 years and concluded: 'Book readers had a 23 month survival advantage and experienced a 20% reduction in mortality risk over the 12 years of follow-up compared to non-book readers'.

INTERESTING LIBRARY FACTS

-The oldest library dates back to the 7th century BC in Ninevah, Assyria (now Iraq)

- Benjamin Franklin started up a lending library in 1731.

- Philanthropist Andrew Carnegie donated \$55 million (\$1.6 billion in today's dollars) between 1886 & 1919 to open 2509 libraries around the world.

- Many early libraries were built with apartments on the top floor.
- Librarians used to have to learn a specific style of hand writing- 'Librarian Hand'
- Most overdue book was 122 years late in Australia's Camden School of Arts, Charles Darwin's 'Insectivorous Plants'.
- The world's largest library is the Library of Congress, Washington DC.
- The Library of Congress pays to reproduce popular magazines in Braille, including 'Playboy'.
- The Guiness Book of World Records holds the record as being the most stolen book from public libraries.
- The Lions outside the New York Public Library's main location are known as Patience and Fortitude. (in case you're a Jeopardy contestant)

Summer was especially fun at the library this year for both youth and adults. Between the fantastic programs and great books, 388 people participated in library sponsored activities. Altogether, patrons logged 6,166 books; 4695 were read by youth and 1471 read by adults. Teens recorded the number of pages read and they racked up 50,106 of them! I zipped through a lot of books this summer and my favorite is probably Tracy Flick Can't Win by Tom Perrotta.

Programs for kids were extra special as Miss Kathryn ended her tenure at HML. Every week, youth could participate in Lego Club, Music Makers Story Time, Messy Art, Open Minecraft, Story Time in the Park, and Afternoon Adventures. There were also special STEAM programs like the Lighthouse Challenge, and Sink or Float. We were happy to have Jeff O'Handley from OCCA offer another exciting program this summer called Tales of the Creek. Monthly programs included Kid's Craft-urdays. Some of the special events that were offered were the Mythical Creatures Hike, the Shell Hunt, Pirate School, the Mermaid Tea Party, and a Stuffed Animal Workshop. Teens had fun this summer too with a Paint and Switch Party, a Nerf Battle, and a bi-weekly TAG meeting.

As always, adults are included in our Summer Reading Program. We offered some fantastic programs like a Container Garden Workshop with Glenda Bolton, a Crochet Mandala Class with Liza Lauritzen, a Fly Tying Class compliments of Trout Unlimited, and a Tile Art Craft with library clerk AJ. I'm always grateful that Ariel, former HML Librarian, continues to volunteer to facilitate the Virtual Book Club with a group of dedicated readers. And the Writers Group facilitated by Jen continued to meet with a special Writing in the Rotunda event where all participants wrote a short story; beginning to end!
